POTAMILUS CAPAX (GREEN, 1832) Plain Pocketbook

CLASSIFICATION:

Family Unionidae (Fleming, 1828) Ortmann, 1911.
Subfamily Lampsilinae (von Thering, 1901) Ortmann, 1910.
Genus Potamilus Rafinesque, 1818.

- CHARACTERISTICS: Shell medium to large, obovate, greatly inflated, subsolid; umbos extremely full, high, sculpture very finely double-looped; surface of disc without sculpture, periostracum light gray-green to yellow to smoky olive brown, rayless; hinge sinuous, cardinal teeth lamellate, long, dorsal cardinal of right valve much longer than ventral cardinal, lateral teeth thin, curved, fairly short; nacre white.
- SIMILAR SPECIES: Lampsilis ventricosa (Barnes, 1823) umbonal sculpture coarse concentric ridges; periostracum yellow or yellowish green to brown, usually rayed, rays often striking, green; hinge simply curved, not sinuous, dorsal cardinal tooth of right valve much smaller than ventral cardinal.

RANGE: At least up until Simpson's time (1914:47), \underline{P} . capax existed in the:

"Lower Ohio River drainage; southwest to St. Francis River, Arkansas; north to eastern Iowa; Elkhorn and Blue River, Nebraska? (Aughey)."

- RANCE IN OHIO: The only in-state records for this species include Sterki's (1907:388) "Ohio River" record and various other collectors' non-committal "Ohio". Recent records indicate that the only known Ohio River tributary that supports this species is the Wabash River in Indiana and Illinois.
- HABITAT: F.C. Baker (1928:250) noted that the habitat of P. capax is "[n]ot well recorded. In Mississippi found on a mud bottom." Parmalee (1967:83) also commented on the habitat:

"[P. capax] is a large river species. . . This mussel has been taken on both a sand and mud bottom, in flowing water, and at depths of only a few inches to 8 feet or more."
